

Mass Layoff Events in Ohio 1st Quarter 2010

During the period January through March 2010, there were 90 mass layoff events in Ohio, a decrease of 122 events from the 1st Quarter of 2009. This resulted in 16,231 separations, a decrease of 25,405 from the 1st Quarter 2009 total of 41,636 separations. Included in the 90 events were 8 establishment closures/partial closures of single or multiple worksites with 1,503 separations. This compares to 20 establishment closures and 5,570 separations from a year ago.

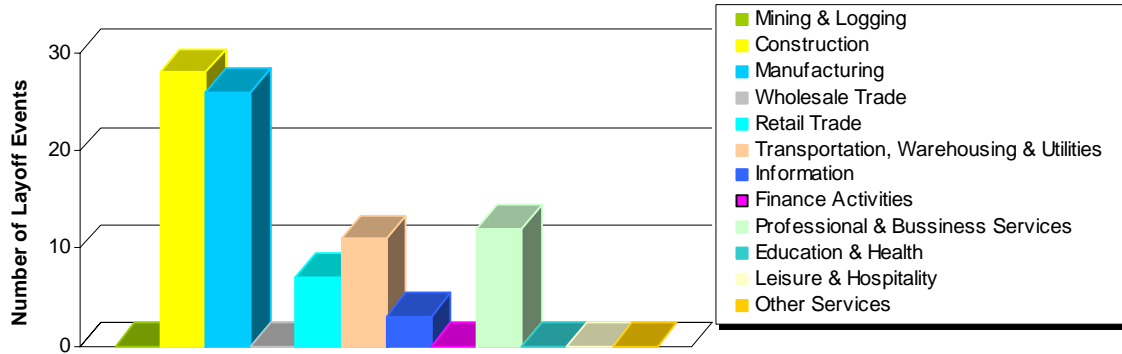
Events by Industry

Construction accounted for 31% of the total number of mass layoff events and 17% of all separations. Manufacturing followed with 29% of the total events but represented 37% of all separations. Eight percent of events were from retail trade but constituted 18% of workers separated.

1st Quarter 2010**

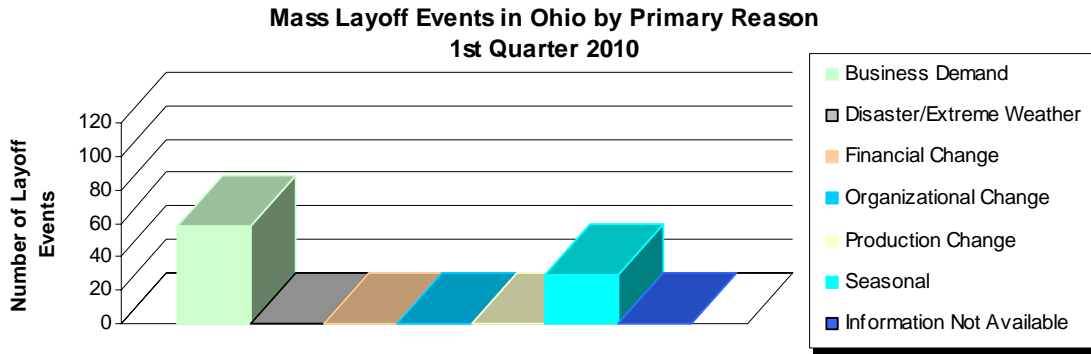


Events by Primary Reason

Business demand was responsible for 64% of all mass layoffs and 63% of all separations. Seasonal events accounted for 29% of all mass layoffs and 31% of all separations.

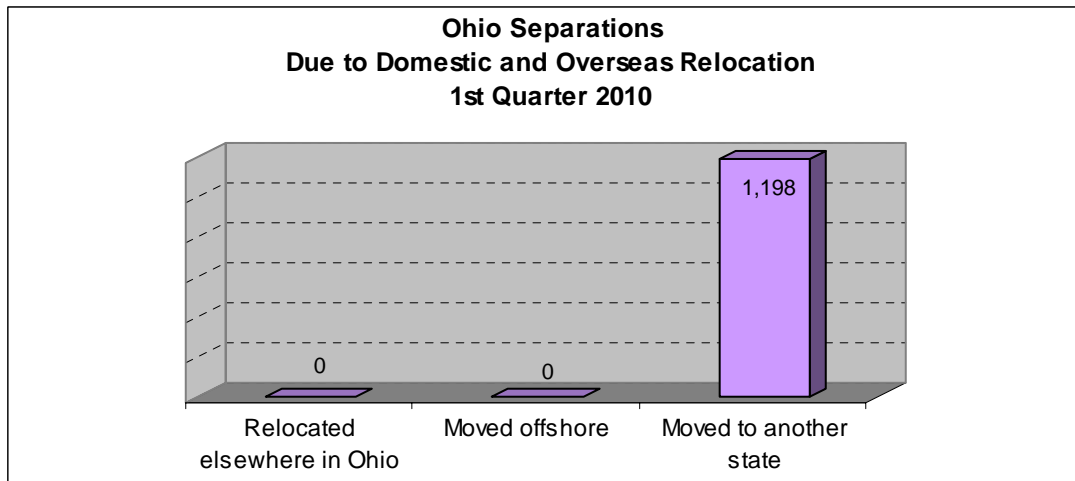

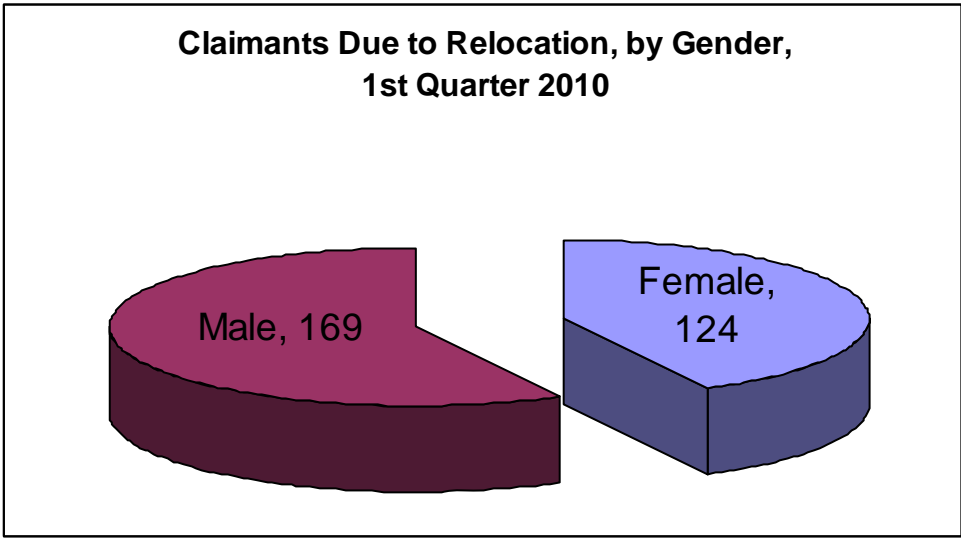


Movement of Work

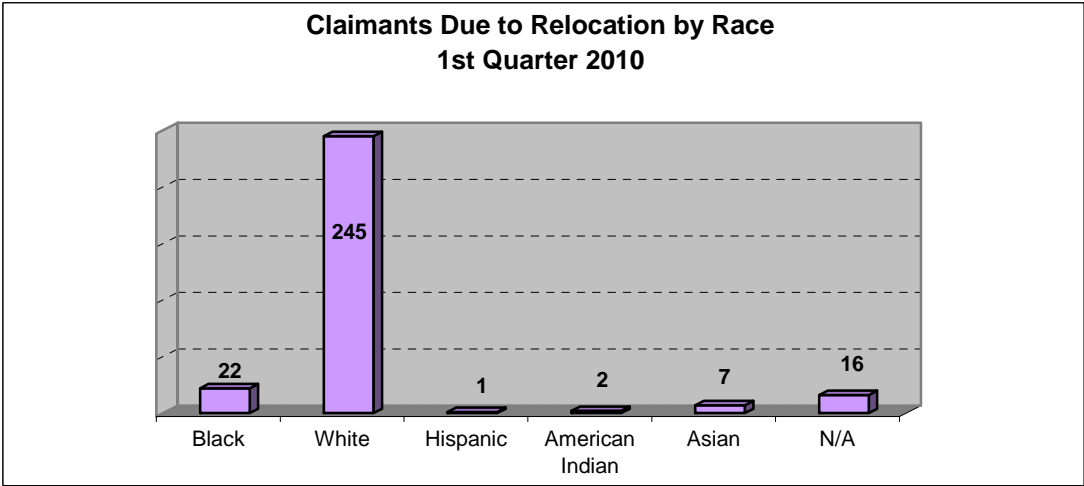
Of the 16,231 private sector non-farm workers who were reported separated from their jobs for at least 31 days in the first quarter of 2010, a total of 1,198 separations were associated with the movement of work. One hundred percent of the jobs were moved to another state as a result of restructuring of the companies. These restructurings resulted in closures in Ohio and occurred in the transportation and warehousing and management of companies and enterprises sectors.



Of the 1,198 Ohio workers reported separated due to movement of work in the first quarter of 2010, demographic data was obtained for 293 workers who filed a claim for Unemployment Insurance. When divided by gender, about 58% of the claimants were male and 42% were female.

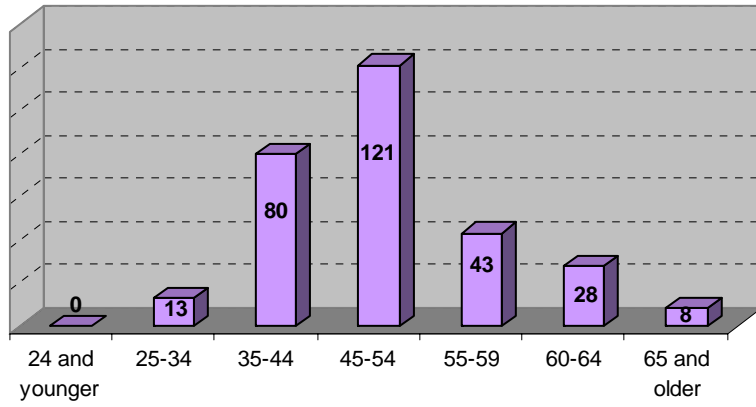


Racial affiliation was reported for 277 of the UI claimants. White workers accounted for 84% of claimants whose jobs were lost due to movement of work. Black workers comprised 7%. These two groups formed 91% of total claimants.



Claimants between 45-54 years old accounted for 41% of all claims, followed by those between 35-44 years old and 55-59 years old accounting for 27% and 15%, respectively. These three groups accounted for over 80% of all claims related to job relocation.
