

# Mass Layoff Events in Ohio 2nd Quarter 2011

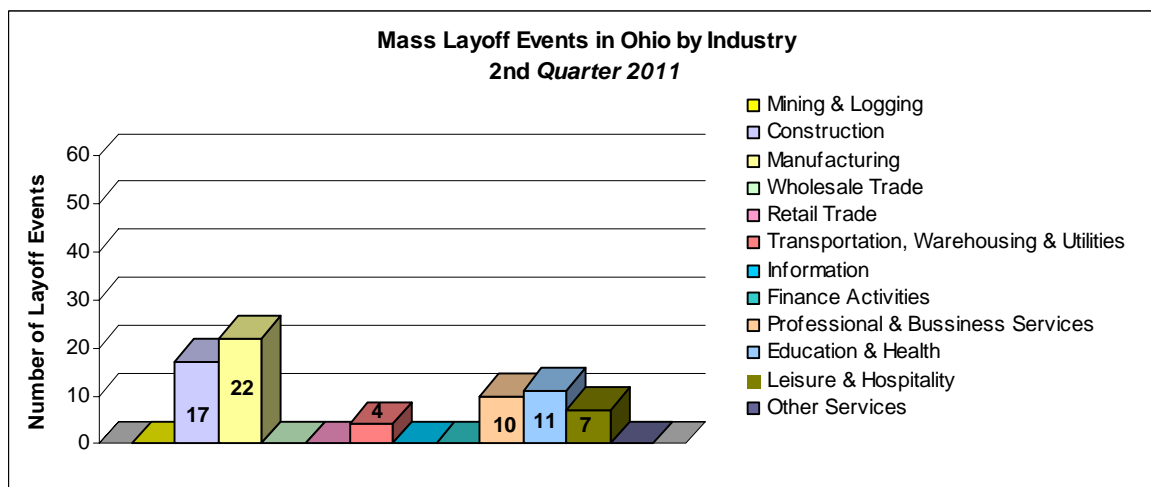
During the period April through June 2011, there were 79 mass layoff events in Ohio, a decrease of 11 events from the 2nd Quarter of 2010. This resulted in 11,244 separations, a decrease of 1,767 from the 2nd Quarter 2010 total of 13,011 separations. Included in the 79 events were 2 establishment closures/partial closures of single or multiple worksites with 145 separations. This compares to 8 establishment closures and 825 separations from a year ago.

## Events by Industry

Manufacturing out paced all with 28% of the total number of mass layoff events and 28% of all separations. Construction followed with 22% of the total events and represented 18% of all separations.

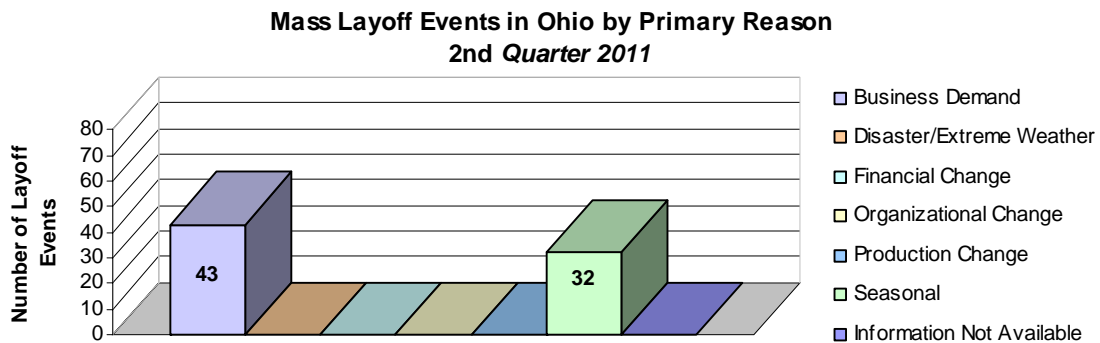


## Events by Primary Reason

Business Demand was responsible for 54% of all mass layoffs and 48% of all separations. Seasonal events accounted for 41% of all mass layoffs and 46% of all separations.

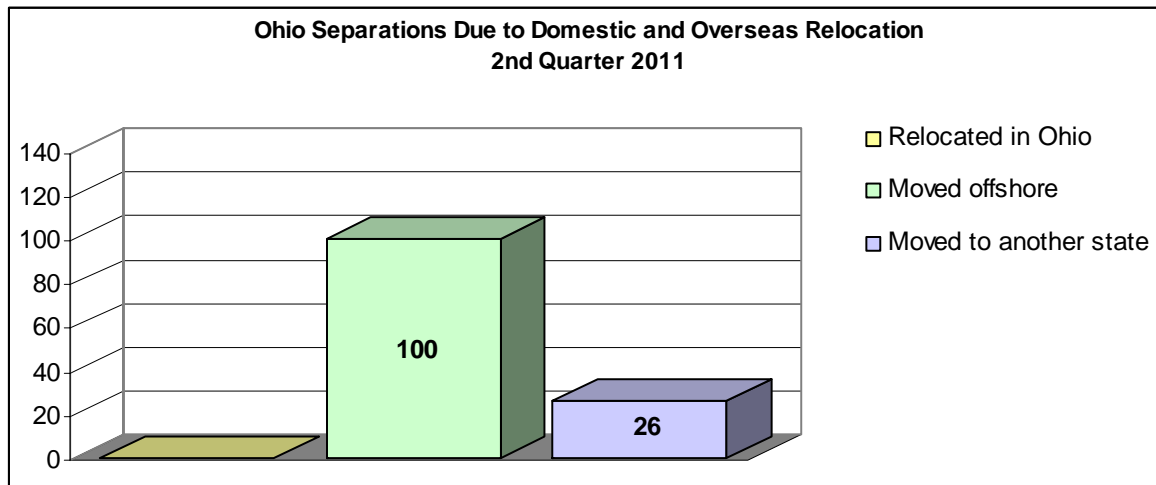

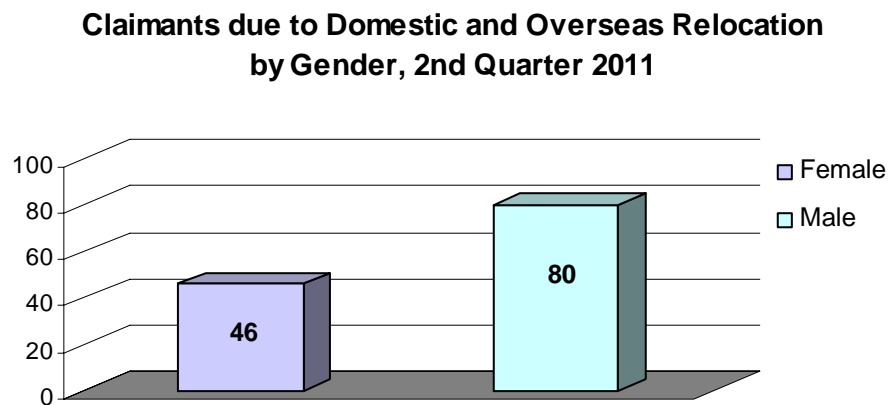


## Movement of Work

Of the 11,244 private sector non-farm workers who were reported separated from their jobs for at least 31 days in the second quarter of 2011, a total of 126 separations were associated with the movement of work. Of these jobs, 100 were moved offshore and 26 were relocated to another state.

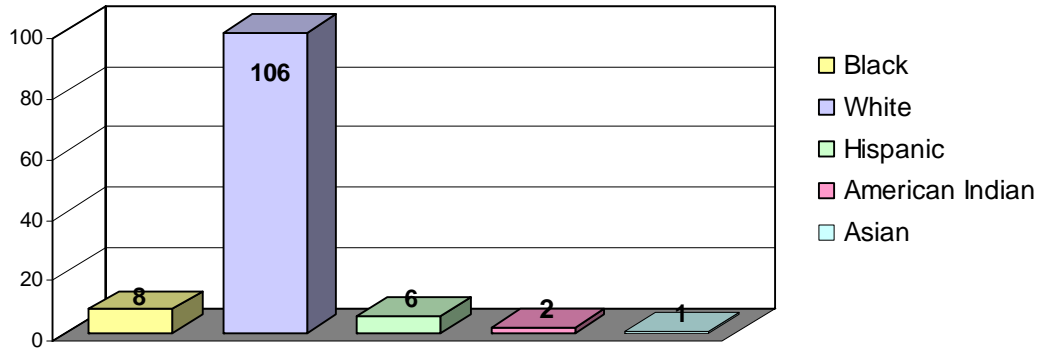


Of the 126 Ohio workers reported separated due to reorganization of work in the second quarter of 2011, demographic data was obtained for 126 workers who filed a claim for Unemployment Insurance. When divided by gender, about 63% of the claimants were male and 37% were female.



Racial affiliation was reported for 123 of the 126 UI claimants. White workers accounted for 84% of claimants whose jobs were lost due to movement of work. Black workers comprised 6%. These two groups formed 90% of total claimants.

Claimants between 45-54 years old accounted for 28% of all claims, followed by those between 25-34 years old and 35-44 years old accounting for 25% each respectively. These three groups accounted for over three-quarters of all claims related to job relocation.
