



Percent of Employment in Firms






Top Occupations with the Most Area Online Job Ads

Industries with high churn will have more openings to replace workers than industries with low churn. It should be noted that this calculation does not include short-term employment that lasts less than a full quarter.










Population-to-Jobs Ratio




Unemployment Claimant and Labor Force Demographics




Age Distribution


