Among the state's 88 counties, preliminary December 2024 unemployment rates ranged from a low of 2.8% in Medina and Mercer counties to a high of 7.9% in Monroe County. From November, unemployment rates increased in 78 counties, decreased in seven counties, and did not change in three counties. The comparable December unemployment rate for Ohio was 4.2%. (See table on next page.)

Seven counties had unemployment rates below 3.5% in December. The counties with the lowest rates, other than Medina and Mercer, were: Holmes, 2.9%; Geauga, 3.1%; Lake, 3.2%; Auglaize 3.3%; and Wyandot, 3.4%.

Five counties had unemployment rates above 6.5% in December. The counties with the highest rates, other than Monroe, were: Ottawa, 7.5%; Meigs, 6.8%; Noble, 6.7%; and Adams, 6.6%.
