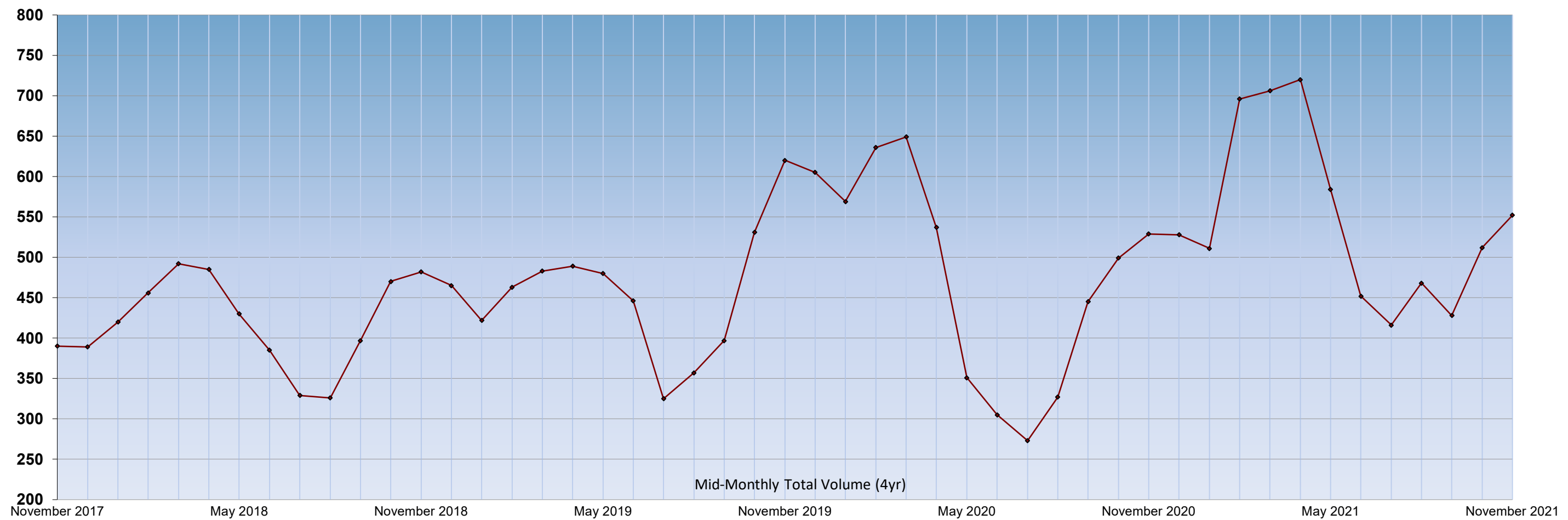


A total of 552 internship ads were posted online from October 14, 2021, through November 13, 2021, for west Ohio. This was an increase of 40 ads from the previous reporting period and an increase of 23 ads compared to the same time period a year ago. The graph below shows historical trends for internship ads posted in this area over the last several years.

This data has not been seasonally adjusted. Sometimes seasonal adjustment is used to remove fluctuations in unemployment and labor force trends that normally occur with changes in the season. Seasonal variation in employment occurs for natural and institutional reasons, including reduced employment involving outdoor activities during winter, changes in labor force and unemployment levels with opening and closing of schools, and layoffs during the automobile model changeover period. Seasonal variations can also affect the number of online job ads, so over the year it will affect the data in this report.
